Many of you have heard me talk about Emmaus Walks being modern day miracles. I have shared that we arrive on Thursday as the people the world has influenced us to be and we are transformed through Sunday. On Sunday we leave as the people God has made us to be. That, to me, is a modern day miracle. Some have asked me about transformation and what if no change was needed or obvious. To this I say that anytime we learn, worship, study, see the Word in a new and different way, gather as community set apart for a specified amount of time, when we pray together, sing together, let go of “stuff” and reexamine our lives...we are transformed. It may not be obvious to us and not right away but as we turn back to our lives as the two on the road to Emmaus turned and went back from where they came, the transformation is shaping and forming our hearts and minds.

This transformation is probably not going to manifest itself in “instant gratification” but the groundwork has been laid and the Spirit is already at work in and through us. One of the most wonderful things about the Walk to Emmaus is that it is structured in a wonderful spiritual way that offers 72 hours away from the world and focuses time on you and your relationship with God! That is powerful and will take some time to permeate in and through you. Others may notice a transformation in some area of your life before you do, but there will be transformation and that is a good thing because that means that we are growing...growing in our love and faith in God, our relationship to God and to others and in our serving the One who made us!

I pray that God will give you a glimpse of transformation in your life and in the lives of others that you may encourage one another as you journey on the way back from Emmaus.

The Alphabet Of Spiritual Blessings

One of my favorite Peanuts comic strips is the one that came out some years ago just a few days before Thanksgiving. Lucy's feeling sorry for herself and she laments, "My life is a drag. I'm completely fed up. I've never felt so low in my life." Her little brother Linus tries to console her and he says, "Lucy, when you're in a mood like this, you should try to think of things you have to be thankful for; in other words, count your blessings." To that, Lucy says, "Ha! That's a good one! I could count my blessings on one finger! I've never had anything and I never will have anything. I don't get half the breaks that other people do. Nothing ever goes right for me! And you talk about counting blessings! You talk about being thankful! What do I have to be thankful for? Linus says, "Well, for one thing, you have a little brother who loves you." With that, Lucy runs and hugs her little brother Linus as she cries tears of joy. And while she's hugging him tightly, Linus says, "Every now and then, I say the right thing."

Our lesson for the day, John 6:25-35, from John's Gospel takes place just after Jesus has taken five small barley loaves and two small fish and had fed about five thousand men and an unknown number of women and children. Amazing is too small an adjective for such an extraordinary feat. Now the crowd is seeking Him out in earnest. Jesus isn't impressed with their sudden interest. "I tell you the truth, He says, you are looking for me...because you ate the loaves and had your fill." Then He gives a word of warning, "Do not work for food that spoils, but for food that endures to eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. On Him God the Father has placed His seal of approval." What Jesus is saying is beware of focusing on the physical, the material blessings in your life. These blessings are generally trivial and transitory. It is a cliché, of course, to say that money can't buy happiness. But the proof is bountiful. There are many, many people who are blessed materially who are miserable. As you sit in your beautiful home before the table loaded with tasty food, do not assume that these are the blessings that most count in life. They're not.

Only one thing really matters in life, relationships—relationships with other people and with God. People who feel loved can be happy in any environment. People who focus on anything else are guaranteed to experience tremendous heartache someday, for everything else is temporary.

A few years ago, someone broke into the home of Christian author and evangelist Anne Graham Lotz. The robber or robbers took everything of value in the home and left Anne with a deep sense of fear and instability. The night after the break-in, Anne lay awake and contemplated her many fears. But then, she recalled a verse of scripture from 1 Peter. Even if the robbers took everything of value from her, she still had an inheritance in heaven that could never be taken away. Suddenly, all her fear left her, and Anne fell asleep counting her blessings.

95% of the believers who face the test of persecution pass it, while 95% who face the test of prosperity fail it.

Here is the alphabetical list of blessings she came up with—twenty-six blessings in all. Anne Graham Lotz realized she was Accepted by God, Beloved by God, Chosen by God, Delivered by God, Enlightened by God and Forgiven by God. She discovered she had the Grace of God, Hope for the future, Inheritance in heaven, Justification, Knowledge of God, Love, Mercy of God, Nearness to God, Oneness with God, Peace and Quickening of the Spirit. She reminded herself she was Redeemed, Sealed with the Holy Spirit, Treasured by God, United with other believers and Validated as an authentic child of God.

In conclusion she decided she had His Wisdom; and one day she would be; Exalted with Him! That's one way of counting your blessings.

The people who followed Jesus after the multiplication of the fishes and the loaves were fixated on the physical miracle. What Jesus wanted them to focus on was the faith that produced that miracle. They were fixated on the bread and the fish. He wanted them to understand that there was a new bread from heaven, He Himself. He says to them, "For the bread of God is He who comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." "Sir," they said, "from now on give us this bread." Then Jesus declared, "I am the bread of life. He who comes to me will never go hungry, and He who believes in me will never be thirsty."

In other words, only one thing matters—relationships, relationships with one another and our relationship with God. The blessings we need to focus on are not physical or material, but emotional and spiritual. This is a hard sell in a land of such abundance.

Our addiction to material goods may actually make us less grateful than if we had very little. If your feeling of gratitude has any relationship to the size of your bank account or the number of toys that you have to play with, you may not ever experi

ence the true spirit of Thanksgiving. Our very affluence may seal us off from God. We may end up depending on our material blessings rather than our connection to God to provide us with both happiness and security. In his book Money, Possessions and Eternity, Randy Alcorn tells the story of a persecuted Romanian pastor who told a group of ministers: "In my experience, 95 percent of the believers who face the test of persecution pass it, while 95 percent who face the test of prosperity fail it." This is a hard message for Thanksgiving. I'm supposed to simply remind you to be thankful for your blessings, but if you're thinking blessings like your hi-def television and your new iPad, then you are going to miss it altogether. Be thankful that God so loved the world that He gave His only Son. Count your spiritual blessings this day. If you focus on them, then you will understand what real gratitude is all about.

A Pilgrimage Through The Holy Lands

“I walked today where Jesus walked in days of long ago. I wandered down each path He knew with reverent step and slow.”

We landed in Tel Aviv and the excitement grew. We were in Israel...26 pilgrims from North Carolina (led by Gary and LouAnn Allred) on a journey through Israel and Palestine. As we departed we were told that if asked we were to say we were on a spiritual pilgrimage. Pilgrimage is best described as a departure from daily life on a journey in search of spiritual well-being. Indeed, it is a departure from all the habits and activities of daily life; fruit, vegetables, cheese (and cheese-cake) for breakfast, early departures for places we had only read about in our Bibles or seen on TV, camels, sheep, and shepherds by the roadside. There is so much to tell you. I'll hit the highlights.

Galilee is composed of Upper and Lower Galilee (distinguished by differences in altitude, climate and vegetation. The mountains of Lower Galilee are less than 2000 feet high while those in Upper Galilee are almost twice as high. The valley roads carried the commerce and military might of the ancient world, making Lower Galilee a place of international concern.

Sea of Galilee (at Church of Primacy of Peter)
The Sea of Galilee is really a fresh water lake fed by the Jordan River. It has many names; Sea of Chinneroth, Sea of Tiberias, Lake Kinneret. It is 13 miles long and 8 miles wide.

We put our feet in the Sea of Galilee. We remembered the parables of Jesus' ministry. There is a church along the Sea of Galilee where we



remember Jesus standing on the rock and telling Peter to feed my sheep (John 21:15-17) It is the Church of the Primacy of Peter. That's the first place I put my feet in the water.

Tabgha is a short distance from the Church of the Primacy of Peter and this is where we remember Jesus placing five loaves and 2 fishes on the altar that were multiplied to feed over 5000 persons.




Our Group Entering Capernaum

Capernaum was the busiest town in Galilee during the time of Jesus' life on earth. It was the center of Jesus' ministry in Galilee. It is a beautiful place where we saw the remains of a synagogue where Jesus taught "I am the bread of life, those who come to me shall not hunger..." (John 6:35). It is a beautiful (and popular) place.

When we visited the Mount of Beatitudes (Matthew 5-7) we shared the site with many others on their pilgrimage...people from all

parts of the world, speaking many languages (Nigerian, Italian, Mexican, Spanish, German). I stopped at one part of the beautiful garden surrounding the octagonal church to listen to our brothers and sisters from Nigerian singing their praises to God.

Beit Shean is located on the Via Maris (an ancient trade route through the Jezreel valley) and is about 15 miles south of the Sea of Galilee. The city has been inhabited continuously for over 5000 years. Jericho could be the oldest city in the world; it was first conquered by Joshua and the children of Jericho (Joshua 2-7). Jesus passed through Jericho while traveling to and from Jerusalem. It is known for springs, well-watered fields, and citrus fruit. Remember Zacchaeus and the sycamore tree? We saw it near Jericho.

In Cana, we remembered the first miracle and we renewed our wedding vows in the Franciscan church built over the spot where it is believed the Jesus turned water into wine. (John 2:1-11)

Bethlehem (“House of Bread”) is about 6 miles from Jerusalem. We went to the shepherd’s field and remembered the announcement of Jesus’ birth from the angels. Just look for the YMCA (ask my fellow pilgrims). Bethlehem is known as the City of David (birthplace of David and Jesus). We entered the Church of the Nativity and were surprised that the birthplace of our Lord looks nothing like we imagine.

We visited many, many more places to include Tiberias, Bethany (down into Lazarus tomb we went), Mt Carmel, House of Caiaphas (where we remember Peter denying Jesus three times), the Upper Room (where the acoustics are phenomenal), Bethesda, the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, the Dome of the Rock (located on the Temple Mount), the Western Wall where we prayed (men and women separately) and placed the prayers we had written on paper in the cracks of the wall. Many of our group did the “dead man’s float” in the Dead Sea. We remembered our baptism in the Jordan River at Yardenit and many of us returned with water from the Jordan.

We walked the Via Dolorosa (the Way of Sorrows) and stopped at each of the fourteen stations of the cross to remember. When you walk the pathway Jesus took to Calvary through the old city of Jerusalem, you can picture the passion, the sorrow, the pain, the sacrifice. The Via Dolorosa ends at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. It is thought that this site is the authentic place for Jesus’ tomb because it has the longer history and oral tradition (rather than the Garden Tomb).

On our last night, we visited the Garden Tomb where the British have created a very impressive, peaceful and beautiful place for meditation. It was there that we shared a communion service where Gary served us from a mother of pearl communion cup he had purchased during the pilgrimage. It was a special time where I was reminded of what Jesus did for us. Our guide so beautifully and thoughtfully reminded us that “it doesn’t really matter if this is the



actual tomb that Joseph of Arimathea gave for Jesus burial or not, because, ladies and gentlemen, He is not here. He is risen!”.

I had always been puzzled about why Jerusalem is so important and until you walk in the old city, hear the so many languages, see the diverse people who co-exist there (Moslems, Jews, and Christians), visit the holy places (Church of the Holy Sepulcher, Western Wall, and Dome of the Rock), and pause to reflect on the layers of civilization, you can’t imagine. Here’s what I learned.

The Dome of the Rock is located on the Temple Mount called Mount Moriah in the Bible (Chronicles 3:1). It is a holy place to Moslems who believe that Mo-



ammed went to heaven from this spot. It is directly over the place that is most holy to Jews and the Western Wall is as close as they can get to the ancient temple.

The Temple Mount was the site of the temples of Solomon, Zerubbabel, and Herod. The rock where Abraham was going to sacrifice Isaac is under the Dome. Moslems believe that Abraham came to sacrifice Ishmael. It is such an important place to all of us. No Christian or Jew can go in and in fact, Jews don’t even walk on the grounds around the Dome for fear of being the Holy of Holies. So, imagine all the history and possible artifacts that could be on the very site! No one will give an inch of this possession to anyone else. And so, we may never know what is really there.

Now that I have walked where Jesus walked, eaten the St Peter fish from the Sea of Galilee, seen the splendor of the desert at Masada, and the lush beauty of the countryside, my life is changed forever. I read the Bible with new eyes and I pray with new passion. My prayer for each of you is that you one day get to take the pilgrimage to Israel.

Two Stories Updated

What value is a three day walk if all the 4th days that follow show no sustained spiritual growth or improved lifestyle?
Here are updates of two testimonial stories that were published in the HOC Newsletters during the last two years.

STORY #1: “It Was Just A Used Book”: Jim Johnson, a pilgrim on HOC walk #108 (Sept. 2009) picked up a book called “Fresh Wind, Fresh Fire” by Jim Cymbala at the used book table. After reading it, he gave it to a friend at the Benson UMC. After he read it, they both understood that the measure of church success is not in attendance, budget or programs; but as Jim Cymbala says: “The measure of a church is simply, do the people experience God.” The book tells of Cymbala’s struggling church discovering the power of prayer. Jim Johnson and his friend decided to meet at 6:30 am every Saturday morning, at the church alter for one hour of pray.

UPDATE: Now, over 20 people are meeting to pray Saturday mornings, Tuesday afternoons, Thursday evenings, and Sunday mornings before Sunday School and others praying for the worship services during the worship hour. Certainly, they have seen many, many answered prayers but most importantly those who have joined into this new prayer ministry have grown in their personal ability to hear the Lord and to trust his Lordship. This prayer ministry started praying for healings and other petitions that God would intervene and change circumstances of those in need. They found that God is more interested in changing hearts than He is in changing circumstances. Jim says: “God is now leading us to join with Christians from other churches who feel the need to pray for our community, its schools, its town employees, its churches and businesses. Our heart’s cry is that we will see God move among us and that His name will be glorified.” The bottom line is that Jim Johnson’s 4th day is still marching on and gaining momentum.

STORY # 2 “Lord Watch Over My Child”, by long time community members Dave & Linda VonDerGathen tells their story of a daughter on a self-destructive path. They detail their difficulties and failures until they had little option but to cry out: “Lord help us, we can’t fix this!” The story recounts how their daughter lost custody of her children to the state of North Carolina and then surrendered her rebellion to the Lord Jesus. Now let them give us an update...

UPDATE: Nearly a year ago Steve Cook asked that I write an article about our long struggle with our daughter Darcy; for the Emmaus Newsletter. I’d written of her academic & social struggles through school. There was substance abuse; attempted suicide at 15 years old. At 22 years; she had two children. Three years later, our grandchildren’s father took his own life. At Darcy’s lowest point in February 2009, her children were taken from her and put in the care of Linda and I. Her life finally hit rock bottom and she had nowhere turn, but to God. One of Linda’s life-changing quotes is “you never know that God is all you need; until God is all you’ve got”.

Through prayer and perseverance Darcy finally turned her life over to Christ and put her many burdens on His yoke; her life is slowing turning around. I reported in the April 2010 article that Darcy & the kids were now attending church with us and she has surrendered her life to Christ

We are thrilled to tell you that Darcy persists in continuing to run her own home cleaning business ‘and’ owning her choices. Linda and I are doing less and less ‘for’ Darcy. She consults us to get our feedback, but makes her own decisions. Some we agree with; others less so, but they are much more mature. Chase and Shanna have been with Darcy for over a year and doing very well. Both grandkids regularly visit a counselor, and we’re overjoyed that they’re adjusting to the many negatives they’ve had in their young lives.

In the testimony from a year ago, I mentioned that ALL relationships require an investment of time and attention and absolutely must be centered in prayer as we can NOT do this without Him.

Also, I mentioned that Darcy wrote a note in last years’ Christmas card that Linda and I have been her “Life’s Training Wheels”.... ISN’T THAT WHAT GOD’S WORD IS FOR US? Life’s Training Wheels?

Haven’t we ‘all’ said at one time or another as we people-watch when we think “I wonder that their story is”... We ALL have our stories; our valleys. Persevere my brothers & sisters..



A Greater Miracle

“Lazarus is dead, and for your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him.”

John 11:14-15, NIV

Jesus was glad Lazarus had died without Him?! What does that mean? We know it doesn't mean He enjoyed knowing that Lazarus had died or that He enjoyed thinking about the family's grief and despair.

Jesus was teaching His disciples - and you and me - a life lesson. And what a life lesson it is! The lesson is this: There is a greater miracle than physical healing! It's the miracle of the Resurrection! Be encouraged!

Even if your prayer is not answered

and your loved one is not healed

and your marriage is not reconciled

and your financial problems are not solved

and your child is not found -

there is hope! Jesus was glad because He knew God would be glorified to a far greater extent by the death and resurrection of Lazarus than He would have been by Lazarus' healing and recovery from sickness.
